The exact courses taken will depend on individual interests in consultation with an academic advisor in the department.

All students are recommended to take both proseminars, ANTH 105 and ANTH 205 to assist them with their professional goals.

MAJOR = 31 credits including:

*4 CORE Courses= ANTH 021, 024, 026, 028;

Three courses in Anthropology at the 100-level or above; 1 of ANTH 105, 205 (both recommended);

2 additional ANTH courses at the 200-level;

1 additional ANTH course at any level

**Optional Concentration in Anthropology of Global Health = 12 credits from the following:

ANTH 026, 040, 076, 088, 089, 141, 143, 146, 172, 173, 174, 179, 180, 184, 189, 240, 241, 242, 285, 288, 290, 293 (relevant internship placement)

of which at least 6 credits must be at the 100-level or higher, and at least 3 credits at the 200-level.

**Optional Concentration in Archaeology and Heritage Management = 12 credits from the following: $\mathsf{ANTH}\ 024, 104, 106, 127, 134, 135, 141, 160, 164, 200, 209, 210, 240, 245, 250, 293\ (\mathsf{relevant}\ \mathsf{internship}\ \mathsf{placement})$

of which at least 6 credits must be at the 100-level or higher, and at least 3 credits at the 200-level.

NOTES:

Anthropology courses can count toward the social science distribution requirement.

CORE courses also satisfy the College's Diversity Category 2 -Non-European Cultures course requirement and the University's D2 requirement.

Students planning to pursue an ANTH graduate degree are encouraged to take a appropriate mixture of 200-level methods and theory courses,

as well as undertake research. Consult your advisor for recommendations tailored to your graduate school objectives.

Distribution Requirements: B.A. degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences require completion of 7 distribution categories:

Fine Arts: one 3-credit course in a fine arts discipline

Foreign Language: two 3-credit courses in the same foreign language

Humanities: two 3-credit courses in a humanities discipline

Natural Sciences: two courses from specific departments; one course must include a lab

Literature: One 3-credit course in literature

Mathematical Sciences: One math course number 17 or higher, or Statistics 51 or higher, or Computer Science 008 or higher, or Philosophy 13, or Anthropology 113/Linguistics 163 or Linguistics 075 Social Sciences: Two 3-credit courses in social science disciplines (anthropology courses can count towards this distribution)

General Requirements:

One Diversity Category 1 course – minimum 3 credits

One Diversity Category 2 course from list of D2 Non-European Cultures courses – minimum 3 credits
One Quantitative Reasoning course-minimum 3 credits

One Sustainability Category course - minimum 3 credits

One Writing and Information Literacy course-minimum 3 credits
