NOTES:

This is merely one suggested route to completing a degree in linguistics.

There is also great flexibility in the major: after LING 080, students may take core classes, concentration courses, and electives in any order.

MAJOR = 33 credits including:

*CORE: LING 080-Intro to Linguistics, LING 160- Intro to Phonology, LING 165-Phonetic Theory and Practice, LING 166-Intro to Syntax, LING 250- Linguistics Capstone Seminar.

One of: LING 158-Intro to Morphology, LING 163-QR:Introduction to Semantics, LING 167-Historical Linguistics, LING 168-Intro to Pragmatics.

6 credits of Linguistics Electives

9 credits of Concentration courses

Concentrations are available in Sociolinguistics (LING 135, 162, 176, 178) and Psycholinguistics (CSD 094, LING 171, LING 177, LING 280).

At least one elective or concentration course must be at the 200-level.

The first three credits of an undergraduate thesis may count toward the major.

Distribution Requirements: B.A. degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences require completion of 7 distribution categories:

Fine Arts: one 3-credit course in a fine arts discipline

Foreign Language: two 3-credit courses in the same foreign language

Humanities: two 3-credit courses in a humanities discipline

Natural Sciences: two courses from specific departments; one course must include a lab

Literature: One 3-credit course in literature

Mathematical Sciences: One math course number 17 or higher, or Statistics 51 or higher, or Computer Science 008 or higher, or Philosophy 13, or Anthropology 113/Linguistics 163 or Linguistics 075

Social Sciences: Two 3-credit courses in social science disciplines

General Requirements:

One Diversity Category 1 course – minimum 3 credits

One Diversity Category 2 course from list of D2 Non-European Cultures courses

One Quantitative Reasoning course-minimum 3 credits

One Writing and Information Literacy course– minimum 3 credits

One Sustainability Category course - minimum 3 credits

>>A TAP course will satisfy UVM's Writing and Information Literacy requirement and might also count toward a distribution.

>>>Diversity courses might also count toward a distribution or sustainability requirement.

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
