## Vermont 4-H Poultry Record Health and Vaccination Record



Many diseases can be prevented by keeping your flock in a clean environment. If it is necessary to vaccinate your flock be sure to do the entire flock at the same time. If using a vaccination or medication that is administered in the water be sure that the birds are thirsty. This can be done by removing waterer for a few hours prior.

Showing poultry may require certain vaccinations. Contact your local Department of Agriculture for specific poultry regulations.

## Vermont 4-H Poultry Record Egg Production Record



Most pullets start laying between 20 and 24 weeks of age. The first eggs are often small and the laying schedule may be irregular. At approximately 30 weeks of age, the eggs should be of normal size and depending of the breed you have raised you may get one egg per pullet every 36 hours. Some breeds may produce at a slightly higher level. Record egg production below:
