Our featured student in the October 2016 issue of IMPACT is Dana Gulley, who is enrolled in the Grossman School of Business's Sustainability Entrepreneurship MBA program (SEMBA).

IMPACT: Dana, tell us where you are from and what you studied as an undergraduate.

Dana Gulley: I was born and raised in Garrison, New York, on the shores of the Hudson River. I grew up playing in the woods and along the river. When I was in high school, I had an amazing opportunity to study in the Bahamas at the Island School, a sustainability-focused experiential learning program. These experiences opened my mind to the critical importance of lessening our impact to the planet and the possibilities that exist for doing so.

I knew I could hit the ground running when I came to study Environmental Studies at the Rubenstein School of

Environment and Natural Resources here at UVM, and indeed, my undergraduate education afforded me much learning and many opportunities to test out my environmental passions in practical settings.

IMPACT: So you are already a UVM alumnus — that's great. What inspired you to go to graduate school at UVM?

Dana Gulley: I spent the past five years working for Riverkeeper, an environmental non-profit dedicated to protecting the Hudson River and protecting the drinking water supply of nine million New Yorkers. As the Director of Community Engagement, I was fortunate to work with colleagues from across the organization as well as volunteers and community partners from throughout the Hudson Valley and New York City.

Pretty early on I discovered that I had as much of a passion for supporting Riverkeeper's continued growth and development as an organization as I did for helping it achieve its mission. At some point, it became clear to me that a Master's in Business Administration would offer me significant skills in order to positively influence environmental organizations.

From there, the new Sustainable Entrepreneurship MBA at UVM was really the only choice for me, as its focus is on transforming business as a force for good in solving some of the world's most pressing social and environmental challenges.


IMPACT: The SEMBA program has been very popular! Tell us about your experiences in graduate school so far.
