PYO MARKETING ON THE VVBGA WEB SITE

You can now list your PYO operation details for free on the VVBGA member web site. It's quick and easy to create a listing, and you can update it anytime, as often as you like. A public-facing section of the web site will allow customers to search all listings, by crop or location. That section will launch in late spring once there is a critical mass of VVBGA PYO farm listings, so please set yours up soon. To create your listing:

- 1) Login to your VVBGA member account, or join the VVBGA, at https://vvbga.org/
- 2) Click "Pick-Your-Own-Listing" on the left-hand menu.
- 3) Click the orange "Add Your Listing" button.
- 4) Click on each section of the listing. A drop down will appear. Fill in all the details relevant to your farm's PYO operation.
- 5) Hit the "Save" button at the bottom of the page after you complete your listing.

February 7. Greenhouses, part 1: greenhouse start up. Planning for a smooth and efficient greenhouse season. Julie Rubaud of Red Wagon Plants in Hinesburg will share practices and lessons learned from her many years as a greenhouse seedling grower around production planning and scheduling for a highly diverse mix of plant species. Chris Callahan of UVM Extension will host, and he'll talk about planning for tunnel start-up and safety.

February 14. Greenhouses, part 2: growing bedding plants for early season sales. Join highly experienced grower Jack Manix of Walker Farm in Dummerston to hear about tips and recommendations for success with bedding plant production. Jack will discuss flat fillers, heated benches, efficient heaters, alarms, and the economics of growing bedding plants. Hosted by Vern Grubinger.

February 21. Habitat plantings to attract insect pollinators and insects that attack pests. Kyle Doda owns 1000 Stone Farm, a 4-season certified organic farm in Brookfield. He will share his experience establishing and caring for pollinator and beneficial insect plantings on the farm. UVM entomologist Dr. Cheryl Frank Sullivan has been involved in beneficial insect-plant interaction research for many years. She will share information about beneficial insect habitat plantings and what insects these plantings can attract. This program qualifies for 1.0 Vermont pesticide recertification credit. Hosted by Laura Johnson.

February 28. Storage crops. What's storing well, what isn't. Growers will discuss their winter pack-out set ups and marketing through the winter. Hosted by Chris Callahan and Andy Chamberlin.

February 15. Cooperatives. Attorney Erika Dunyak, Vermont Law and Graduate School. Cooperatives as a business structure help maximize their resources and distribute profits equally among members. They can also foster a strong community since members work and vote alongside each other. This session covers different types of cooperatives and what to consider before filing.

February 22. Agricultural Labor Laws. *Attorney Sean Fontes, Partridge Snow & Hahn.* Understanding guidelines for classifying employees (intern, part-time, seasonal, full-time, etc.) is important for remaining in compliance with labor laws. Join Attorney Sean Fontes to learn about employee rights, benefits, minimum wage, pay equity, and overtime for different employee types. This session is for employers at all stages of hiring but especially for first-time employers.

February 29. Easements. Attorneys Andrew Marchev, Christina Reiter, and Veronica Gassert; Three Rivers Law. Easements on a piece of property significantly influence how land can be used. Attorneys Andrew Marchev, Christina Reiter, and Veronica Gassert will present the different types of easements and common conditions found in each.
