Public Forum

Tom Murphy, Executive Director of Phi Mu Delta Fraternity

Visiting UVM to establish a new chapter of Phi Mu Delta. Mission is to create an organization that is diverse, and is seeking new leadership and membership for this year. Issue facing Greek Community at UVM is hypocritical actions, we are looking for great leaders, no year of graduation matters. In addition, looking to coordinate any types of programming, in order to reach out to other groups. About 800 alumni who are currently active, and will give \$500 scholarships to any who are interested in joining. Chair Glynne: Is it difficult to find interested men who would join since there are already established fraternities?

Murphy: We are open to all students, and yes, but by reaching out to populations and groups of men, such as members of LGBTQA and men of color

Chair Cafarelli: What was the reason it disappeared years ago?

Murphy: Just died, not for academic or disciplinary reasons.

Annie Stevens, Ass VP for Student and Campus Life & Dr. Jon Porter, Director of Center for Health and Wellbeing

We have had one student with confirmed case of H1N1, however it has been difficult for students to tell the difference between H1N1 and the common cold, as well as influenza. We are working on the contingency plans to keep the campus healthy, and preparing for just a really bad flu season. On the UVM home page, the UVM Emergency Info link has lots of good information for symptoms, etc. CHW and Dean of Students Office are finishing the flu clinics to help students combat the regular seasonal flu. We will start receiving the H1N1 vaccination which will logistically be distributed either in nasal spray or in vaccination style to students, faculty, and staff. We have been trying to put out good information about coughing, sharing utensils, washing your hands etc.

Senator Vivas: Is it true that the H1N1 vaccine has certain things in it that increases the likelihood of increasing autism?

Porter: I think you are referring to thimerosal, which is in the vaccination, however not the nasal spray. According to my sources, and the CDC, there is no correlation to autism.

Senator McDonald: Since there seems to be a trend for some doctors for not testing, is the CHW following this same protocol?

Porter: That difference in testing – diagnostic helps us decide in this situation, but what we really want to know is when H1N1 is here in serious numbers, so the surveillance testing is occurring to help us know that.

Jackie Nicoll, Audience: I went to the Medical Clinic, I came in contact with the individual who had H1N1 and had all the symptoms, why not tested?

Porter: Goes back to surveillance testing, we are only doing about 10 cultures a week, although we are seeing double the number of students who have the symptoms. The tests come back a week later, so we cannot use that information because most people are better by that time. In terms of the treatment being different, it is not.

Chair Glynne: Does UVM have a quarantine policy?

Stevens: We are not following a quarantine or isolation policy because it is not recommended since it is not as serious. We have asked faculty members to be more relaxed with their attendance policies, but there is no policy in place for that.

Senator Buswell: Are there other more serious strains that are being tracked as well?

Porter: H1N1 is where the focus is at this point. Of all the surbillance tests doing, only about 1/5 of people getting tested are actually getting it.

Chair Cafarelli: How is VT compared to other states as far as statistics?

Porter: infrequent, Pacific North-West and South-west have been highly affected just not the Northeast, although it is expected.

Senator Greenwald: What is the recovery time for H1N1 vs. the common flu?

Porter: Indication that H1N1 recovery time is 3-4 days and quicker than the flu. People tend to bounce back faster.

Senator Greenwald: Is there a difference in time between recovery time and time when they are contagious.

Porter: 24 hrs before symptoms start is when students are contagious. They are most infectious to up to 24hrs after their fever decreased below 100.

Senator Frye: Is it not as bad as the media has been telling us? It really doesn't sound that bad.

Stevens: More contagious than the seasonal flu, and hits your age pop harder than all other times. It's bad in terms of how you will feel, but not as bad as what we will see with other flus, but the number is higher – creating a spike in absenteeism – it's bad because of that, not because of the medical stuff that happens.

Senator Henley: Because UVM has even more tightly packed rooms than usual, what sort of public health measures are being taken in the dorms, have the RAs been trained to deal with this?

Stevens: RAs will be spoken to as well as soon as we see the numbers start to rise. The other piece is that when you and your roommates are sick, there will be valuable information distributed.

Porter: To put some sunny context on this, age 49 and above, probably has something to do with the fact that this has been seen generationally, so it means that it may be a positive thing to have exposure to parts of this. We can't keep people from being exposed, simply that it is manageable.

Chair Burns: Other than the obvious difference, what are the differences between the nasal spray vs. vaccines?

Porter: Folks with asthma and respiration issues, should not take nasal spray.

Senator Buswell: Could you tell us about the origin of this virus and what we have done to make it so easy to spread?

Porter: Avian – part bird, swine, and human genomes included in this virus, which appears new to an immune system. We have never seen this particular virus from these species, which is why it is so new.

Stevens: The southern hemisphere has seen it while they were in their winter months, now it is just coming back to the northern hemisphere for our winter months.

Senator McDonald: You mentioned that you will prioritize who will have this, who, and how?

Porter: We fully anticipate that there will be enough for all of UVM and the US, but would like to encourage the public to get this coverage by way of mass media messages.

Senator McDonald: How many vaccinations are necessary to develop an immunity?

Porter: only 1!

Senator Henley: Any side effects from these vaccinations?

Porter: One will be the redness, perhaps achiness and feverish.

President Jones: So if my roommate gets sick, and they are told to get back home and they are unsure because they are not told, I know that if I get sick, I will alienated. Is it ok to take care of each other?

Stevens: Please take care of each other, this is just like any other public health issue. We are working with Dining Services to make sure things are place to help bring back food for roommates, etc. There is a form online for sick-tray forms. All I ask is that you send out the word to check your email – that will be the best way to keep up to date on this issue, and forward them if you feel it is necessary. Thanks for your help with this.

Nick Monteforte: Hello everyone, I'm Nick.

Monteforte: You should vote for me because I'm enthusiastic and I love to be involved. I love my community and I enjoy building friends and relationships. I look forward to a good year and I don't quit.

Graham: I think I can offer some additional information and better the ties between SGA with IRA, I'm enthusiastic and hardworking.

Nicoll: I have been involved with SGA for the past year and more, and so I understand the time commitment. I am busy, but will put this time into SGA. I also think that I can offer a different perspective as a Human Development Major

Shushereba: Completely different perspective as a 30 yr old single mom, veteran of Air Force and am interested in becoming involved.

How would you describe the work of the SGA?

Shushereba: I think it is good to learn the process, unfamiliar with most students' governments and interested in what goes on.

Nicoll: See it as the umbrella organization and am amazed by how much you all reach out to the community. I can help progress these initiatives and add to what you have.

Graham: SGA is an integral part of the university and important with involvement with admin.

Monteforte: I think SGA is awesome and have been involved in the past, by being on the Senate I would like to continue to move UVM forward and brighten student horizons.

Unknown Senator: What made each of you decide to be a Senator?

Monteforte: I've been involved in the past, and you all seem awesome and I want to continue my passion to be involved.

Graham: I hear many student complaints and I think that I can better resolve those issues by also being in the SGA.

Nicoll: Freshman year I knew nothing about SGA, and sophomore year I became the minute taker, you can't imagine how frustrating it is to sit here and have no opinion, and now I am ready to be involved.

Shushereba: Always wanted to be a part of an organization since being a part of the Air Force, so I see the Senate a way to be a part of an org bigger than myself.

Chair Maciewicz: If you could pick one area in which the University is going in the wrong direction – what would it be?

Graham: many of my residents last year were baseball players, so budget cuts

Monteforte: Only gotten to see so much since I have been here for one month, but also budget cuts.

Shushereba: A lack of direction for veterans, the process is quite choppy – I would do more to change that, I went to a meeting for veteran support, I would like a more formalized process to change incoming veterans.

Nicoll: Communication, so many things that happen and the student body doesn't get informed. I think the media should come and report on the work that we do, such as having a weekly column. I remember when the 30 students who were arrested, communication was lost there.

Chair Glynne: In your eyes, has SGA done anything that you don't approve of, and if so, what project would you take on to improve what has been done wrong?

Nicoll: In a group of candidates that ran together, that was a great way to get elected, but I think that it presented an issue, because it left little ability for anyone else to get on Senate. Interest in Elections Committee to help monitor that. We should address what happened and set some standards.

Shushereba: I have not seen anything that has been done wrong, only witnessed one meeting.

Monteforte: Haven't seen anything wrong, I love getting the emails from Bryce.

Graham: Last year I felt there was a break between what students and SGA admin would be communicated.

Senator Buswell: HELLO! How would each of you define diplomacy?

Monteforte: To me I see it as a group of people collaborating their ideas together to see what should happen as a group decision on the value of the people you are serving.

If I was on Senate, I hold true to my values and integrity, and that's how I would do that.

Graham: I would abide by the views of the constituents, such as my residents in L/L and in IRA. What issues to be dealt with and how to deal with those issues, and then come to a decision to act on.

Nicoll: I am thinking of being diplomatic, in the sense of the SGA, it is about being aware of all opinions and the people you are representing. You are intended to come together and represent 10,000-11,000 people, regardless of your own agenda.

Shushereba: Something and carrying on diplomacy is something I am familiar with. I couldn't tell people what I really felt, so as a Senator, I would remember to be careful of my interaction so that my own personal viewpoints and off-color thoughts are not bled through so that my message would be conveyed without offending.

Senator Henley: I know that when we discussed this as a committee, we would like to look for Senators who do not represent groups already here. Who is your community?

Graham: IRA, I work with them and my role in Student Advocacy.

Nicoll: I am a minority here and am Jewish, and although I do not know other religions, I am a part of the religious community, and am in the College of Social Work and Education as a Human Development Major – and am pre-med.

Monteforte: I represent all students, but primarily first year students. I am a business major, and am on the Club Crew team.

Shushereba: Veterans and non-traditional students, parents, full-time transfer students.

Senator McDonald: Are there any issues in which you are particularly interested in that you would like to address as a Senator?

Shushereba: Veteran Organization which I founded.

Graham: Access around campus, particularly during winter months.

Nicoll: Communication with clubs, or with people in general. Some people do not realize that you can come to SGA to get help with problems, particularly with club leaders. I think it is important that people can place a face to the name.

Monteforte: I agree with communication, but also interested in the Health and Well Being and the issue of substance abuse. Keeping everyone aware.

Senator Benes: What committee do you feel you would be the best rep for?

Shushereba: Honored to be on any committee, but COLA because I most identify with that charge. I would give to every committee I was appointed, but I can offer most there.

Nicoll: Almost every committee, but I love dealing with people. PR

Graham: Student Action, although I would like to be placed anywhere.

Monteforte: I love interacting with people and I have experience with clubs, so SAC.

Motion to move to Executive Session: Chair Wilkinson- Ray

Speaker Ellis: Would someone please go invite them all in? Applauding will happen around the oath.

Chair Chevrier: Point of Procedure

Senator Buswell: Can we do this without being spiteful? Motion to suspend the rules.

Seconded.

Vice President Ash: I will support the suspension of the rules, if I may facilitate conversation to majority vote as to how you would like to notify candidates their confirmation status.

Speaker Ellis: Motion to suspend the rules – rules are suspended.

Vice President Ash: Facilitate conversation in regards to the speaking order. Discuss briefly on how we want to do this. The two options are as follows: notify by telephone

or email, or I will notify candidates now; this will determine if appointees are to take oath of office next week or right now.

Chair Glynne: I am of the opinion that there are certain traditions that whether good are bad are important for Senate. We voted the way we did. We voted for two to join the body. It's not a popularity contest. We shouldn't candy coat losing. All of the other races are like that. You find out immediately. Last year we did. It's a tradition that our democratic system supports and I agree with it.

Chair Maciewicz: Motion to do an informal poll on two options as described by Vice President Ash

Senator Henley: Pass

Senator Doran: I just I don't so much have a problem with us telling with them now but I feel like with them up there it would be bad.

Speaker Ellis: VP goes out and makes it known to them that they were not appointment and then the other two come up and take their oath

Senator Altendorfer: Although I don't agree with the status quo of appointments. We should just continue on with the tradition because they are all waiting now. We should discuss this at a later date

Senator John-Freso: If it's a matter of taking out there bags or something. We have had them go through three layers of acceptance. It won't be public humiliation. This is part of Senate. If you can accept things with grace you shouldn't be a part of Senate:

Chair Wilkinson-Ray: Confused. What do I do?

Speaker Ellis: You could reinstate the rules

Senator Henley: I would like to suggest that Vice President Ash goes out there notifies the candidates and offers to bring them their belongings from this room.

Chair Wilkinson-Ray: Yield to Rifken

Chair Rifken: I suggest that candidates reenter to gather their belongings and then leave the room, then they will be notified by Vice President Ash.

Vice President Ash: Katie, I will take your suggestion.

Reinstatement of the rules.

Speaker Ellis: Go invite the guests in.

Oath of Office taken by Nick Monteforte and Shanna Shushereba

Vice President Ash: Shushereba is to be placed on COLA. Monteforte is to be placed on PR.

Senatorial Forum

Senator Tran: Shirts for hockey games are going to be handed out Sunday.

Chair Chevrier: I would have like to have seen secret ballots...

Speaker Ellis: Out of Order, you may not discuss conversations had during Executive Session.

Chair Glynne: Executives are taking too much control or maybe not too much. I support Exec. If you do something bad Exec will let you know. We have appointed 5 senators. We are not becoming a completely democratic body. Bad idea. If we keep appointing people, it just isn't democratic. Process is too long. This is the meat of the year. Midterms, thanksgiving, winter. We are going to need to have midterm elections.

Senator Frye: Apologize for session. I was unclear about etiquette. Perhaps being oversensitive. I believe it would be beneficial if we could be more relaxed in Senate. There seems to be times when it makes sense to not follow the rules. I just want to voice that. Can we please go in that direction?

Senator Church: Appointments process seems questionable. I reiterate Chair Glynne's points. In addition, we haven't actually filled all of the open spots. We should be doing the appointments process doing it and getting over it. Bring more folks up than the available spots.

Chair Chevrier: Votes that are about other students should be done secretly because we need to be courteous to them and to the student body and beyond. It seems like its information that people don't need to know.

Chair Rifken: We got a lot of VSOP comments this time around. Everyone had to. Comments about concerned with the direction and focus with the SGA on environmental issues. How is SGA being perceived. This is an issue to people. The poll did focus on environmental issues. Not the only thing SGA is working on. It 's something I have thought over a lot. Any suggestions? It is PRs job but this is kind of a concern and others have approached me as well.

Senator Buswell: Congratulate both on remembering oath. WE probably should expand discussion about appointments and elections to both committees. We need to figure out how midterm elections will work. Open discussion now or later date or listsery. Elections stick around.

Senator Henley: Process tonight – Remind you all that it's great when we disagree with each other but we do have a commitment to treat each other well and with respect and some of us are still getting familiar with this process so go easy on us. VSOP – use tabling and office hours to get some ideas out not just environmental issues. It's not a bad thing that environment is a big issue because these are big deals – students are interested in these things.

Chair Wilkinson-Ray: So as far as the appointments process goes, precedent should not be a reason that we stick with things. Things aren't going well and exec is at fault. We haven't cleaned up procedural things – senatorial forum, appointments

Senator Altendorfer: Perhaps, a secret ballot can extend to the idea that we still raise our hands but it still remains secret. When we went about the vote the time that it would take up to count up the votes is something that we need to look at.

Speaker Ellis: don't speak about executive session

Senator Church: I voted against....

Speaker Ellis: Out of Order, please do not discuss conversations had in Executive Session.

Chair Chevrier: You can talk about things broadly.

Senator Altendorfer: Transparency is key to democracy.

Chair Wilkinson-Ray: You had to abstain because you would see that person. I think that secret ballot is a good idea.

Chair Maciewicz: Doesn't the constitution something about internal business? Couldn't we take that out.

Chair Wilkinson-Ray: Would you support informing applicants at a later date that were appointed later – informal poll – is happening

Senator Altendorfer: fix it up

Chair Wilkinson-Ray: Naysayers talk to me.

Executive Reports
