As the newest addition to the HESA faculty, it was awe-inspiring to see so many alums reconnect with their alma mater. As an Assistant Professor with a joint appointment in the Higher Education Student Affairs (HESA) graduate program and the Social Foundations of Education program Education, I have the best of both worlds. KEEPING HESA CONNECTED



This summer 25 years ago, Keith Miser, the then-Dean of Students at the University of Vermont, conceived a brainchild: a "high quality, professional journal" with a teaching mission at its heart— a publication that would serve as professional development for the graduate students in the Higher Education and Student Affairs (HESA) program. Several other instiTVC is a means through which publication and editorial experience are made attainable to graduate students, where we comprehend our own capacity for valuable contribution and receive peer feedback in an atmosphere of challenge and support. Dr. Miser pointed to these two developmental dimensions as imperative in the propulsion from student to professional, noting TVC's effectiveness as a vehicle for this purpose. "It is critical to do something like that [undergo peer review]," according to Dr. Miser, "without being defensive or afraid."

As we embark on the creation of the twenty-fifth edition, we remain conscious of the principles on which the journal was established and reflect on the growth it has experi-

Dr. Miser's vision took it one step further – to a bound copy of professionally reviewed and printed scholarly articles produced under the leadership of a student editorial board – with the hope of inspiring and instilling self-confidence and selfefficacy in soon-to-be student affairs professionals.

Through the publication of TVC, the fledgling sevenyear-old HESA program gained national recognition and credibility as a reputable professional program, a welldeserved and well-maintained identity. Perhaps more importantly, the journal continues to fulfill the role for which it was named, keeping connections alive between students, faculty, alumnae, and friends of UVM's program.

To this day, Dr. Miser stated, TVC is "the best journal of its kind...

To this day, Dr. Miser stated, TVC is "the best journal of its of its kind... kind [published by graduate students] in the nation." Along with the HESA

Miser set aside funds from his own program budget to support the start-up of the journal. He immediately brought the idea to students, seeking their input and leadership in shaping the journal's creation. The role of editor was incorporated into the graduate assistantship in Dr. Miser's office and HESA

student Mike Dunn became the first editor. Almost immediately, several graduate students became invested in the project. They too envisioned a scholarly journal that would engage HESA students and alumnae in meaningful exploration of critical issues in student affairs. After great debate and a moment of creative genius in front of a map detailing the origins and whereabouts of HESA students and alums, *The Vermont Connection (TVC)* was titled.

Even since his 17 years at UVM (1971-1988), Dr. Miser still maintains his Vermont connection to UVM, HESA, alums and students, and TVC. We had the pleasure of meeting and working with Dr. Miser in a couple of capacities this summer. Throughout our interactions, Dr. Miser offered tremendous historical anecdotes, insightful observations, and encouraging words regarding the production of *The Vermont Connection*, its meaning, and its mission. program, TVC has "grown in quality, production, and content." So, in honor of its roots, with an awareness of its present importance, and in light of its certain bright future, here's to *The Vermont Connection*'s 25th Edition.
