2004-2005 TVC Faculty Liaison, Bridger Turner Kelly

Greetings from the Green Mountain State! Unbelievably I am beginning my fourth year here at UVM and in the HESA program. It has indeed been my pleasure to work with faculty colleagues who pour their minds, hearts and souls into making the program the best it can be, and to learn along-side the HESA students who represent a bright beacon of hope for the future of higher education.

This year marks the beginning of a new course for me in the program. Research in Higher Education is a required course I am teaching this Fall to second year HESA students. The purpose of this course is to prepare future leaders in higher education to understand, assess, evaluate, and plan programs and policies utilizing current research in the field. In addition to critically analyzing research in higher education published in The Journal of College Student Development, Journal of Higher Education, Review of Higher Education, About Campus, Academe, and Change magazine, students will read four books that many of you alums might find interesting as you seek ways to provide a culture of evidence for the types of programs, policies and services you offer to students.

The first text, Assessment in Student Affairs: A Guide for Practitioners (1996) by M. Lee Upcraft & John H. Schuh serves as an overview of student affairs assessment and as a guide to assessment efforts in the field. Our own Kathleen Manning and her colleague Fran Stage edited the next text, *Research in the College Context: Approaches and Methods* (2003), and it is a rare text that discusses the various ways research on college campuses is conducted, analyzed and disseminated. Another text authored by a HESA faculty member is *Liberating Scholarly Writing: The Power of Personal Narrative* (2004) by our University Scholar, Robert Nash. Robert has utilized his background in the humanities to develop Scholarly Personal Narrative, which seeks to help writers find meaning in their own narrative. We will round out the texts in the course with *The Vulnerable Observer: Anthropology that Breaks Your Heart* (1996) by Ruth Behar. This book of ethnography and memoir examines the observer's relationship with the observed and highlights the role of the self in research.

As faculty liaison to TVC, it is my hope that this course, in conjunction with the other courses my colleagues offer, gets students excited about conducting and writing research that contributes to the betterment of the field. I know this year will be a remarkable one for the student run journal and I am glad to be offering professional development, active engagement, and support throughout the coming year.


whole institution fits together.
