Notes:

This is merely one suggested route to completing a history degree with an Africa/Asia/Middle East/Global history concentration. The path followed by students will depend on AP credits, study-abroad travel plans, etc. Students focusing on this area might choose to take both general courses on Global History as well as focus on African, Asian, or Middle Eastern history. So, while this area of concentration is widely construed, it is possible for students to focus on one of the particular geographical regions highlighted above. There is also great flexibility in the major and many courses are transnational, meaning that they might count for credit in more than one geographical area (e.g. HST 113; Global History in the Age of Total War).

Africa/Asia/Middle East/Global Concentration = 15 credits in Africa/Asia/Middle East/Global history courses, including at least one 200-level seminar; at least 6 credits in American history; and at least 6 credits in European history.

MAJOR = 33 credits to include:

One introductory-level survey course (HST 009-068),
HST 101,
At least 15 credits of 100-level or above HST courses,
At least 3 credits of 200-level or above HST courses,
9 additional HST credits at any level,
Complete one of three Concentrations.

Restrictions:

No more than 6 credits of AP or IB History can count toward the 33 credits required by the major.
No more than 3 credits of AP or IB History can count toward a concentration.
No more than 6 credits of Internships, Research, Thesis credits, Independent Study credit may count toward the 33 credits required of the major.

Distribution Requirements: B.A. degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences require completion of 7 distribution categories:

Fine Arts: one 3-credit course in a fine arts discipline
Foreign Language: two 3-credit courses in the same foreign language
Humanities: two 3-credit courses in a humanities discipline
Natural Sciences: two courses from specific departments; one course must include a lab
Literature: One 3-credit course in literature
Mathematical Sciences: One math course number 17 or higher, or Statistics 51 or higher, or Computer Science 008 or higher, or Philosophy 13, or Anthropology 113/Linguistics 163, or Linguistics 075
Social Sciences: Two 3-credit courses in social science disciplines

General Requirements:

One Diversity Category 1 course – minimum 3 credits
One Diversity Category 2 course from list of D2 Non-European Cultures courses – minimum 3 credits
One Quantitative Reasoning course—minimum 3 credits
One Sustainability Category course - minimum 3 credits
One Writing and Information Literacy course— minimum 3 credits

>>>A TAP course will satisfy UVM's Writing and Information Literacy requirement and might also count toward a distribution.
>>>Sustainability courses and Diversity courses might also count toward a distribution.

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
