


The University of Vermont's new Office of International Partnerships and Programs (IPP) leads the campus' global engagement strategy, while overseeing the Office of International Education (OIE). The unit's goal is to support comprehensive internationalization for UVM by aligning and coordinating supportive policies, programs, and initiatives that position UVM internationally and enable global connectivity. In this inaugural impact report, we highlight some of the goals and accomplishments of IPP and OIE over recent years.

The IPP office launched in Fall 2023 and immediately embarked on a series of interviews to understand the broader landscape of international collaboration and partnership engagement at UVM. The interviews involved campus senior leaders, deans, and faculty. We also conducted an audit of UVM faculty collaborations, collecting information from 161 respondents. Figure 1 summarizes the geographical distribution of these collaborations. IPP's interviews and faculty audit provided insights and baseline data that enabled us to establish four near-term goals. These goals include:

- Developing mutually beneficial international partnerships
- Improving global operations policy and procedures
- Enhancing our international academic and mobility programs through expanded study abroad programs and curricular integration of study abroad
- Supporting international students' success

To support the achievement of these goals, IPP launched a Faculty Advisory Group on Internationalization with representatives from across campus. Representatives include: Kristen DeStigter (LCOM), Dror Etzion (GSB), Courtney Giles (CEMS), Shana Haines (CESS), Holger Hoock (GC), Abigail McGowan (CAS), Taylor Ricketts (RSENR), Karen Westervelt (CNHS), and Asim Zia (CALS). IPP is making progress toward these internationalization goals. Activities include exploring partnerships with Indian universities.



In summer 2024, IPP piloted ISERV (International Summer Education and Research in Vermont), a summer internship program with faculty from the College of Engineering and Mathematical Sciences (CEMS) hosting undergraduate students from the Indian Institute of Technology-Madras in their labs for two months. The program serves to create connections between IIT-Madras and UVM by training the students, having them contribute to ongoing research projects, familiarizing the students with some of UVM's strengths, and creating opportunities for graduate recruitment.

Further, IPP is collaborating with Finance and Administration, the Office of the Vice President of Research and Risk Management to facilitate faculty members' global engagements, assess international health and safety, streamline travel arrangements and more. IPP is also launching a website meant to support UVM's global operations, whether you are a faculty, staff, student or visiting scholar.

To support academic and mobility programs, we are launching new opportunities for UVM Semester Programs in Barbados, South Korea, and potentially Australia. Additionally, we are leading a curriculum integration initiative in 2024-25. This initiative, with the support of faculty and staff across campus, will chart opportunities across UVM's curricular programs and across students' academic careers so that students and advisors can easily see when, where, how and why they might engage internationally in study away opportunities.

In support of international students' success, we are launching a fundraising campaign to support international scholarships for international students at both the graduate and undergraduate level.


Office of International Education


Semester and Summer Study Abroad by Academic Year




Semester and Study Abroad Participation in AY 2023-2024

Major Study Abroad Initiatives in AY 2023-2024

Curated the study abroad portfolio to more closely align with student opportunities and campus curricula. Established a new pre-departure orientation in a hybrid format, emphasizing cultural preparation for life abroad, program-specific focus, and including parents in the health and safety/logistical portion.

Adjusted advising model to focus on program content areas beyond a regional focus. Improved marketing materials, forms, and systems to simplify student processes and clarify expectations.




Academic Year 2023-2024 Travel Study Courses



Travel Study courses are UVM credit-bearing courses with an international travel component for some or all of the course.

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Sample Course Highlights

New in 2024 - Puerto Rico: The

Intersection of Mindfulness, Compassion, and Planetary Health (CNHS) – Students will spend a week participating in wellness activities such as yoga, dance, and meditation, and learn about the benefits of these activities in combating burnout in the healthcare field.

New in 2024 - France: Comparative Education, Language, and Culture (CESS) – Students will travel to three cities in France and examine the education system, particularly in comparison to that of the U.S.

Repeat Course - St Lucia: Community Development (CALS) – This long-standing CDAE program is a continuation of a fall semester course focused on community development in St. Lucia. Following their UVM classroom learning, students work in small groups on applied development projects around the island.

Courses in Development for Academic Year 2024-2025

In addition to courses delivered this year, development work is well underway for Academic Year 2024-2025 courses. Currently, there are 25 courses in development spanning 17 countries. Destinations included this coming year where UVM did not have travel study courses in the past academic year include: China, Germany, Iceland, Poland, and Norway.

3. Independent Travel

Academic Year 2023-2024 Independent International Student Travelers

In addition to our structured study abroad and travel study opportunities, the OIE supported and evaluated 171 independent student traveler registrations. This travel spanned 30 different countries and five continents.

Undergraduate, graduate, and medical students completed research abroad, traveled to present at conferences, participated in medical rotations, represented UVM in case competitions, engaged in service-learning activities, debated in international competitions, and completed internships.

Highlighted Opportunities:

- The Lawrence Debate Union traveled to Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, for a tournament. Last year, students from the University of Dar es Salaam debate society also had the opportunity to visit UVM.
- Larner College of Medicine participated in global health rotations in the Dominican Republic, Uganda, and Vietnam, exposing them to health systems in the Global South.
- The UVM MEDVIDA Club traveled to Tamarindo, Costa Rica, for a service-learning trip, assisting with mobile clinics and a community development project.



4. International Student & Scholar Services

International Student Population

UVM international student services team supports a community of degree-seeking undergraduate and graduate students as well as non-degree exchange students. International student numbers reflect Fall 2023 enrollment. Note: The Office of International Education continues to work with international students up to 3 years beyond graduation while supporting them on post-graduate work authorizations. Not included in the data are UVM students who are not international students by immigration status but whom the OIE supports in orientation, advising, and programming for non-immigration matters.

International Scholar and Employee Population

UVM's international scholars and employees team serves a community that includes international postdoctoral associates, faculty, visiting graduate students, visiting scholars, staff, UVM Medical Center dual appointees, and other special UVM appointments. Our team supports the immigration needs for these populations as non-immigrants while also partnering with outside immigration counsel on permanent residency sponsorship.

International Community Programming

The International Student, Scholars, and Employee Services staff develop programming to the UVM community supporting the personal, social, cultural, immigration, and academic needs of UVM's international community.

OIE-hosted programs include:

- Monthly Waffle Breakfasts
- Cultural Kitchen Cooking Evenings: Zimbabwe, Oktoberfest, Czech Republic, Nigeria, Nepal, and Tex-Mex
- Community Service Programs in partnership with the Green Mountain Book Festival, Feeding Chittenden, ReSOURCE, and the Intervale Conservation Nursery
- International scholar and employee community-building events
- Thanksgiving Meal Program in homes with UVM faculty and staff

Beyond these stand-alone programs, the OIE runs a peer-to-peer buddy program that had 70 participants in AY 2023-2024 and a community host (UVM faculty/staff) program that had 12 participants.

In addition, the OIE partnered with others on campus for collaborative programming including an Iftar celebration with Mosaic Center for Students of Color and the Interfaith Center, a family breakfast with the Graduate Student Parents Club, and an End of Year Celebration and Awards Night with the International Student Club.

International Student Award Winners

The OIE continued its third year of international student awards during the campus awards season. **This year's winners were:**

- Emerging Leader Award: Shakira Iyanda for her leadership of the Graduate Students of Color Association
- Community Builder Award: Mazen Elsaadany for his leadership of the Middle Eastern Student Association (MESA) and contributions to the Arab, Middle Eastern, and Muslim student experience at UVM.
- Commitment to Justice Award: Soham Mehta for his role as a founding member of the International Student Club and leadership in the Rubenstein School's Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and Access (IDEA) Committee.
- Positive Change-Maker Award: Tess Ritter for her long-term commitment to UVM's International Student Club for the duration of her UVM studies.
- International Student Club of the Year Award: International Graduate Student Association for creating an inclusive and geographically diverse organization for UVM's growing international graduate student population.
