

4-H Promotional Video





Create a fun and inspiring video that invites others to participate in 4-H!

What do you enjoy about your 4-H experience and what would you like to share with others?

Here are some tips and guidelines for your 4-H Promotional Video:

- Your video should inform, entertain, and convince the audience. The goal is to spark the viewer's interest to learn more about 4-H!
- Assume that the audience does not know anything about 4-H.
- Be sure to include information so the viewer can learn more if they would like by including the UVM 4-H Program website: https://www.uvm.edu/extension/youth
- 4-H Promotional Videos should not be solely about your club but about the 4-H program in general to speak to a wider audience.
- The video must be no more than 1 minute in length.
- Be sure to get permission of anyone interviewed or featured in your film. You can use the release found here: https://4-h.org/wp-content/uploads/2016/02/4-H-Filmmaking-Media-Release-Agreement.pdf
- Videos should be submitted to your county educator ahead of your regional day and will be evaluated in advance.
- Videos that earn a blue ribbon will continue on to State Day where they will be played before the audience on a projector. For State Day, videos will be evaluated the day of.
 - Videos may be submitted as either an individual or group project.
 - Have fun and get creative!
