Director's Notes

Basil Kreimendahl is a celebrated writer and recipient of a number of prestigious fellowships, commissions, and residencies. He self-describes as a "working-class, transgender artist, whose work often explores the intersection of language, class, gender and sexuality." Semi-autobiographical and deeply personal, with *Orange Julius* Kreimendahl, "initially set out to, 'explore the children of Vietnam vets and how the war affects the children of those soldiers and their relationship to them' [...] eventually taking "a deep dive into 'masculinity" to look at the "complication of this father/son relationship, and a trans person's desire to have their father see them as a man and as a son' "(*American Theatre*, 2017).

I came upon this piece while revising *THE 1510 Diversity in U.S. Theatre*, a course I inherited in 2021 as a brand-new Harris Fellow at UVM. In addition to the study of identity-inspired contemporary plays, I also reimagined the syllabus to consider the impact of under/mis-representation on shaping the U.S. canon of dramatic literature. When season programming and curriculum curation leave out certain perspectives, whose are chosen, why, and what is the legacy of those decisions? How are some playwrights deploying artistic excellence and innovation to hold up a mirror to The American Theatre itself? What power might this small Liberal Arts program (or even this single course) have to make a meaningful intervention in the field and in society?

The piece in that class that continues to surprise me most is Orange Julius.

Through a timeline fragmented as radically as we experience the (re)membering of our own lives, *Orange Julius* collages lived memory, imagined pasts, and a storytelling present to offer us a vivid portrait of family and of longing for connection and mutual recognition before it's too late.

Each term in which I teach 1510, students of wildly diverse backgrounds and identities find common ground through this play and its characters. Alienation etches out treacherous fractures in community, even and sometimes especially in cramped old lecture halls. However, this play's expansiveness and curiosity about what it means to be human, flawed

and on a journey, somehow reaches across aisles in ways I never fully imagined when working it into my syllabus.

Thanks in no small part to *Orange Julius*, I have witnessed classrooms transformed into impassioned learning communities, rich with sensitive insight, trust, profound emotional vulnerability, and enhanced understanding. It is an honor to finally lift this play here, to deepen our learning through the rigor, challenges, and joys of theatre making, and to be doing it right now.

Thank you for joining us at the theatre.

Jennifer Bilbo (Costume Designer)

Jennifer has been a costume shop manager, associate and assistant costume designer for theatre, dance, and opera for 25 years. Her education includes a BFA in Theatre from William Carey College and a MFA in Scenography from University of North Carolina-Greensboro. Jennifer was Associate Costume Director for Shakespeare Theatre Company, where she worked with designers such as Catherine Zuber and Linda Cho on over 40 productions. Jennifer was also Costume Shop Coordinator for Santa Fe Opera, where she worked with Constance Hoffman, Ann Hould-Ward, and Brigitte Reifenstuel. In NYC, Jennifer was assistant to Murell Horton and Jennifer Moeller, as well as associate designer to Isaac Mizrahi on Mark Morris dance pieces premiering at San Francisco Ballet and Mark Morris Dance Group at Brooklyn Academy of Music. Jennifer was costume shop manager for Marshall University and University of Southern Mississippi. Jennifer was shop manager for the Department of Theatre at Dartmouth College for 8 years, where she was grateful to mentor many extraordinary students. This is her 4th production at UVM.

Andy Butterfield (Fight Choreographer)

Andy is an SAFD-certified actor combatant with training in Broadsword, Rapier/Dagger, and Hand-to-Hand combat. Additional national projects in Middle Eastern American Theatre with: Noor Theatre, Golden Thread Productions, and New Arab American Theatre Works. Her 2020 dissertation "Carried in One Woman: Reflections on Arab American Female Solo Performance" draws on her own lived experience and explores the longings for home and belonging expressed across much of this work. Zeina's writing is published in Études, Al Jadid, Arab Stages, and Howlround.
