
Conference Recordings

Zoom Etiquette & User Tips

For an optimal experience for everyone, there are a couple of items to keep in mind during the conference. Note that the University provides a list of behavior expectations for all events; they are listed on page 5.

- 1. Mute your audio. For the majority of the program, you should mute your audio when you are not speaking by making sure there is a red line through the microphone icon. Staff will help with muting if we're experiencing background noise.
 - 2. Enable video based on your comfort. Feel free to keep your camera on or turn off especially if you need extra bandwidth to view the presentations.
 - 3. Use Chat. We will use the Chat function to pose questions for our conference speakers, share links, and have online discussion during the conference.



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Zoom seems to default the screen View to the gallery mode that allows you to see a grid of participants. If you wish to just see the person speaking next to their slides, free feel to adjust View (located in the upper right hand of the Zoom screen) and select Speaker mode.

Breakout Rooms

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You can also hide participants who are not using their video and hide yourself (from your view).

Trouble shooting Audio

If you are having trouble with your audio after you join the conference, you can click on the ^ symbol next to the mic icon to open audio settings. You can manually select the microphone and speaker and/or select "Test Speaker & Microphone..." to test your audio settings.

If you continue to have trouble with your audio, switch to phone audio to listen to the presentations. You will find those phone numbers on your Zoom confirmation email.

Eric Bishop von Wettberg. Dr. von Wettberg is a crop geneticist at the University of Vermont where he and his team conduct research on community plant breeding and genetics legumes, focusing on mung beans, adzuki beans, and forages. Ann Hazelrigg. As our favorite UVM Extension plant pathologist, Dr. Ann Hazelrigg is the faculty lead for UVM Extension's Community Horticulture programs, Pesticide Safety Education Program, and Integrated Pest Management (IPM) program. She is also the director of the Plant Diagnostic Clinic.
