

# Defoliation at Fox Hollow

Section of trail hiked: From Fox Hollow Panther Mtn.  
trailhead to Fox Hollow Lean-to, about  
0.4 mile each way.

in late-June during normal full-leaf.

Only Forest Tent Caterpillars seen on: SUG, ASH, BB, BASS, OAK  
Beech & MO understory Only little defoliated, maybe < 20%,  
many leaves with holes in them. Same for CARP  
NOT defoliated: RM, HEM, HB

No Gypsy Moth or E. Tents seen here.

Defoliation allows shade-intolerant European weeds to invade. When defoliation ends, & trees leaf-out fully, weeds should decline. The first segment of trail, the new segment, parallel Fox Hollow Road down to the old trail head; this segment is dominated by a nearly pure stand of Alliaria. Further up the trail several weeds are plentiful along the trail in the register bath areas around the lean-to: Dandelion, Curly Dock, Mullein, Garlic mustard (Alliaria), & Galeopsis.

Defoliation is concentrated on the middle slopes & lower ridges, seldom in the valleys. This may be because valley bottoms, like Fox Hollow have forest gaps [lawns, houses, old fields, etc] which make it more difficult for the larvae to move.

Fox Hollow looks more like Fleischmanns with local defoliation, >80% in overstory & <50% in understory, not severe around Phoenixia. Maybe this is because the caterpillars are moving west & haven't had enough time for a more thorough defoliation before pupation.
