Beginner: Can mount, walk and halt unassisted in a small group.

experience. Advanced: Steadiness and correctness at walk, trot and canter. An independent seat (2-point position), soft hands and capable of handling a spirited horse.
On the first day of class, your instructor will determine your class by the information you provide in this application and observation in the first class. Intermediate and Advanced English riders may have the option of splitting into jumping
and on-the-flat lessons on Friday and Saturday afternoon at the instructor's discretion.
BIO-SECURITY
 Do not remove your horse from trailer until your documents have been checked. All equine must be free of disease and not show any signs of sickness.
 If signs of illness are present, we reserve the right to ask for the removal of the horse from the grounds. Your
horse/pony will come in contact with 40 other animals so it is very important that they are healthy. Most equine illnesses are easily transferable.

- All required forms must be in a paper format. No digital forms allowed.
- All horses are required to have a negative Coggins Test and a rabies vaccination in the past 12 months.
- It is <u>highly recommended</u> but not required that your animal also have a flu/rhino vaccine. Call your vet right away as this test involves lab work and can take time in processing.

HELMET SAFETY

- Helmet Rule: All youth and adult participants are required to wear a helmet containing the SEI/ASTM label.
- All Non-4-Hers must sign the enclosed "Assumption of Risk" form in order to participate.
- **4-H'ers** do not have to sign this form they have already signed in a previous year. If you are unsure, it is best to fill out this form. **This is a requirement of the University of Vermont. There are no exceptions.**

ON-SITE CAMPING

VERMONT 4-H HORSE PROGRAM EQUESTRIAN HELMET RULE

1. Effective January 1, 1993, all youth under 19, participating in any 4-H equestrian activity, regardless of riding seat, shall wear a properly fitted equestrian helmet which carries a current ASTM/SEI approval with secured chin harness properly fastened at all times when mounted on an equine or in a vehicle being pulled by one or more equines.

2. It is the responsibility of the rider or the parent or guardian of the minor rider, to see to it that the headgear worn complies with such approved standards and carries the proper seals, and is properly fitted and in good condition. Due to degeneration concerns, equestrian and sport manufacturers recommend replacement every five years. The University of Vermont Extension system, Organizing Committees and Licensed Officials or Leaders are not responsible for checking headgear worn for such compliance. The University of Vermont makes no representation or warranty, expressed or implied, about such headgear and cautions riders that serious injury may result despite wearing headgear, as no helmet can protect against all foreseeable injuries in equestrian activities.

3. At any 4-H equestrian activity, the official activity manager (e.g. show manager, clinic organizer, club leader) may, at his/her discretion, check a participant's equestrian helmet for proper standards. If the participant is found to be wearing an unapproved, defective or improperly fitted helmet, he/she will not be permitted to participate in any mounted or driving activity until proper helmet is acquired.

4. The approved helmet requirement supersedes all hat and helmet requirements as stated under appointments in the current set of rules and regulations.

RULES & EXPECTATIONS FOR 4-H HORSE CLINIC

- All participants should be working with their horses on a regular basis prior to the clinic, including leading and making sure your horse is not in your personal space.
- Arrive on Thursday, between 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m.
 (If you cannot make it by this time, call Lorrie Churchill in advance at 802-276-3385)
- Coggins & Rabies, as well as health certificate for out of state horses, must be checked before your horse/pony is unloaded. As soon as a horse or pony is unloaded, check for injuries and ill effects of transport.
- Safe and proper attire must be worn at all times. All riders must wear a hard-soled boot or shoe, with heels, while mounted. Helmets carrying a current ASTM/SEI approval, with secure chin harness, will be worn at all times, when mounted. Riders should wear appropriate footwear, jeans or breeches, and a comfortable shirt. No shorts, when riding, and <u>no bare feet or sandals at any time</u>.
- Horses are to be kept in their stalls, when they are not in class, or signed up for turnout. You can sign up for turnout times at the orientation meeting on Thursday night or at the first morning meeting on Friday.
 All horses must be in their stables by 4:00 p.m. <u>unless</u> they are signed up to be on the Turn Out List. <u>No exceptions</u>.
- Each rider is responsible for his/her horse or pony at all times, including feeding and grooming, plus cleaning of stalls. Beginner riders may be assisted by older riders.
- Horses and ponies should have adequate fresh water <u>at all times</u>, except when overheated.
- Stables are inspected daily. Stable areas must be kept clean and orderly, horses properly groomed, and tack cleaned thoroughly at all times. See attached for the Stable Management evaluation form to help you prepare.
- All entry and exit to the grounds must be through the entrance clearly marked with the 4-H sign. No entry beyond the South Side of the English Ring (near bathrooms).
- Sawdust will **NOT** be provided.
- Immediately report any illness or injury, to you, or to your mount, to Lorrie Churchill.
- Participants must attend all demonstrations and workshops.
- No "horse play" around stable area!
- No glass bottles on the grounds.
- Each club or group of riders (if not in a club) must have at least one adult supervisor with it at all times.
- Horses must be hand <u>walked</u> (not ridden) to and from classes. Riding in ring only. No riding bareback.
- All horses must leave the fairgrounds by 5:00 p.m. on Sunday afternoon.
- Please tie a red ribbon on your horse/pony's tail, if he/she kicks.
- No dogs allowed.
- All horse poop on grounds must be removed by responsible owner (e.g., during turnout, etc.).
- All youth participants (ages 8-18) must participate in our Stable Management Evaluations and Workshops. Adults are encouraged to attend informational workshops and help as evaluators for youth stable management.
