

Alcohol, tobacco and illegal drugs are not allowed at 4-H meetings, events or activities. Please refrain from any use of the above mentioned or you will be asked to leave.

The water is chlorinated but is not recommended for human consumption so bring drinking water. Some horses will not drink the water; you must know your horse and plan accordingly.

ASTM/SEI properly fitted helmets are required at all times by anyone who is mounted or driving, including Lead Line. Please refer to the "New England 4-H Horse Show Rules and Guidelines, Revised 2022 for proper attire and more complete rules.

PAPERWORK NEEDED: <u>All paperwork needs to come with the HORSE and trailer.</u>

(a) Current Negative Coggin's test, (b) current proof of rabies. <u>Your horse will not be allowed off the trailer without this paperwork!</u>

CAMPERS: May arrive between 4PM and 8PM WEDNESDAY, or between 8AM and 8PM THURSDAY. **HORSES:** May not arrive before 8AM THURSDAY (if you are not arriving Thursday, please note this on your entry) **NO PETS ALLOWED!** NO SMOKING OR BIKES IN OR AROUND THE BARNS! **Bikes found in the barn area will be jailed until the end of the show.** NO CAMPFIRES! This refers to anything with an open flame.

An exhibitor must apply in writing to the state 4-H Livestock Educator, Wendy Sorrell, via email at: <u>wendy.sorrell@uvm.edu</u>, with questions regarding **unusual equipment** or other matters that are not clearly addressed in the program or guidelines and not addressed at the show. This must be done at least a month ahead of time. **To request a disability-related accommodation to participate in this program, please contact Wendy Sorrell by June 10, 2022 so we may assist you.**

All vehicles/trailers are to be parked in designated areas. There is no parking between any buildings in the horse area and the roadways. This is a safe place to unload your horse and equipment, but you **can not stay parked** in that area. During the day the roads around the barns are closed for everyone's safety. Please do not drive over or around cones. **STABLING**: All **pre-entry** participants will be stabled by club. A single member attending from a club may request to be next to another club on the entry form. Entries must be received by post-mark of **June 25th** to be considered pre-entry. Post entries will be accepted, no guarantee of stabling or with your club. Stalls are \$60 per stall for the weekend, and are non-refundable. They are available Thursday through Sunday. All horses staying overnight must have a stall. (You are not allowed to use nails, screw-eyes, etc. with the portable stalls, plan accordingly.) Horses stabled on the grounds must participate in at least 2 classes over the weekend, to occupy a stall. **Bedding will be available by PRE-PURCHASE on your entry form**. The shavings will be delivered to your stall area. Upon your departure, your stall and the aisle way **must** be completely stripped and put on the manure pile. Tack stalls may be available if we have extra stalls, at \$60. **CLUBS** must fill out an entry form (Club Name) and send to secretary with payment for **TACK STALLS**.

Lights will be turned off at 10:00 P.M. If you need to check on your horse, please use a flashlight. CAMPING: See arrival times above. All campers must be in place by 8PM Friday. No camping/staying over on Wednesday or Sunday night. Exhibitors may stay on the grounds in campers and/or tents. Each family staying on the grounds is asked to pay \$15 for the weekend if not paying for electrical hookup. Again this year you may camp in the 4-H Exhibit Hall for \$25. (See separate sheet for restrictions) These fees help to offset our grounds expenses. Please fill out the camping form. Any unit using electricity or water hook-up will be subject to the \$65 fee for hookups. Camping fees are payable in advance on the form enclosed, all <u>camping fees are non-refundable.</u> If you wish to have a camping space next to someone, please indicate that on your camping form. Camper bar spaces will be marked in advance. The upper part of the grounds are only marked by group, first come, first served on the 30 amp breakers. Plan on bringing water splitters and extension cords. If renting, please put the name the camper was rented under on the camping form in addition to the exhibitor's name.

Quiet time in the camping areas begins at 10:00 P.M. This helps everyone get a good night's sleep. Please be considerate.

OTHER FEES: Pre-entered classes are \$7 per class. Entries received after a post-mark of June 25th will be charged an office fee of \$25. Stall fees are <u>non-refundable</u>. Classes added at the show will be \$10 per class. Class drops will not be refunded, and there will be no class 'swaps'. Numbers are \$2 and you may keep them. You will be issued a "set" of numbers and are encouraged to use one on each side of your saddle pad for best identification by show officials. Numbers must be visible on both sides, if not on your back. **T-shirts** will be available by pre-purchase only for \$15 each. Please order with your entry on order form, they will be Iris Blue this year. <u>Stall fees, camping fees and T-shirt money must accompany your entry</u>. T-shirts are ordered on June 25th. Classes may be paid upon your arrival. Registration goes faster if all fees are paid ahead of time. Questions at the show need to go to the managers and/or committee members. No one may approach any judge.

Everyone will be asked to volunteer for various parts of the show. Please be generous with your assistance.

Members are asked to remain on the grounds for the duration of the show, and may leave only when accompanied by a parent, legal guardian, or other responsible adult with prior arrangement.

All riders/drivers are eligible for a 4-H Championship, a Gymkhana Championship and one show Championship may be chosen. You may ride all seats, but must determine which championship to ride toward on the entry form.

The patterns used for Fitting and Showmanship, Trail, Western Riding, Western Reining, and Ranch Riding will be published in the pattern booklet handed out at the Secretary's booth when you register.

HORSE SHOW AGE DIVISIONS: All ages (except Lead Line) are as of January 1 of the current year. See the "Championships" section for age criteria for championships and qualifier classes.

Beginner: Riders 8 years through 18 years, walk and trot/jog only. Those over age 12 should be in their first or second year of showing.

Advanced Beginner: Riders 8 years through 18 years. Riders will be asked to walk and trot/jog and will be asked to canter/lope done briefly, individually or in small groups or for a short period of time. Riders in this division should not have shown one season or eight shows as an Advanced Beginner.

Walk/Trot/Canter Divisions*:

13 & Under (Ages 8-13)

14-18 years

* The ages may be subject to change according to entries. Management reserves the right to balance the two divisions.

<u>CLASS DESCRIPTIONS</u>: Please refer to the "New England 4-H Horse Show Rules and Guidelines, Revised 2022 for further information not covered here. It is available on the UVM Extension web site.

Command Class: This is an elimination contest where any rider not executing the judge's exact commands promptly and correctly will be eliminated. The judge may ask contestants to walk, jog or trot, canter or lope, reverse, halt, back, to go from any gait to any other gait and to canter or lope in a counter lead. Each command will be given twice. By the time the second command is given, (specifically when the announcer or judge has stopped speaking) the horse must be performing that command. When at the halt, movement forward, backward or to the side will result in elimination. Head movement of the horse or rider will not count against the entry. Tack, appointments, equipment as per seat ridden.

Costume Class: To be judged on originality, creativity and workmanship. Will be held in the small ring after jumping is finished.

Driving Tack, Equipment, and Attire: See New England 4-H Horse Show Rules and Guidelines.

Driving Reinsmanship: A driving class in which entries are judged on the knowledge, ability, and skill of the driver and the communication between driver and horse. To be shown both ways of the ring at the walk, jog trot, and road trot or alternate gaits. Drivers will be required to rein back. The horse should respond promptly and willingly. To be judged 80% on handling of reins (and whip if used), control, posture, technique, and ability of driver and 20% on condition and fit of harness and horse.

Pleasure Driving: A pleasure driving class in which entries are judged primarily on suitability of a horse to provide a pleasant drive for a youth. Open to all pleasure driving animals. To be shown at a walk, trot, and extended trot both ways of the ring. Must stand quietly and back readily. It is emphasized that this is a pleasure class and that a good entry is one that will provide a pleasant, responsive drive for a child driver. The pleasure driving class is judged 60% on manners and performance, 20% on suitability as a child's driving animal, 10% on way of going and 10% on condition and fit of harness and vehicle and neatness of attire.

English Performance: To be shown at a walk, park trot and canter both ways of the ring. The park horse should display brilliance and animation in his/her performance along with proficiency in executing the required gaits. Horses should stand quietly and back readily. **Saddle Seat ONLY.**

Equitation: To be judged on hands, seat, position, and ability to control the horse at the walk, trot/jog, and canter/lope (depending upon division). Individual tests may be required of some or all exhibitors. See the guideline for specific tests. Please note: The Maiden Equitation is for riders who have not won a first place in a walk, trot/jog, canter/lope equitation class at the State 4-H Horse Show. (No Advanced Beginners in Maiden)

Melissa Issler Alumni Equitation: Equitation class for any former 4-H member who has ridden previously in this show. See rules for Equitation classes.

Fitting and Showmanship: To be judged on showmanship with the horse in hand, both standing and at a walk and trot and on fitting evidenced by grooming and condition. Conformation not to count. Patterns will be posted. Two classes will run at the same time. <u>All exhibitors for each class will enter the ring in a posted order, work their pattern, and</u> <u>return to the barn then return to the ring for final pinning. Any not returning to ring forfeit any prizes.</u>

Gymkhana: Rules and patterns will be available at the booth and posted at show.

Hunter Hack: Horses are to be shown at a walk, trot, canter, and a hand gallop both ways of the ring. The judge may ask for extended trot. All horses are required to jump two fences no more than two feet six inches high. **No Advanced Beg.**

Hunter Under Saddle: For hunter-type horses and ponies. To be shown at a walk, trot, canter and hand gallop. Extended trot may be asked for. The Hunter should be obedient, alert, responsive and move freely with a ground-covering gait.

Jim Wallace Memorial Pleasure: Open to all W/T/C riders mounted on horses or ponies (no beginners/advanced beginners). Can be English or Western. To be judged as a pleasure class.

Judging: Exhibitors will judge two-four classes of 4 halter and/or performance horses. Judging will take place 8:00 AM Saturday, 7/9 in the small ring. Seniors will fill out written reasons on a pre-determined class to break any ties. All others will be asked questions to break any ties. You will need your exhibitor number for this event. **Please listen for announcements.**

Jumping: In all jumping classes, **novices will not be allowed** to cross-enter into the WTC jumping classes. Courses will be posted. Advanced Beginners may only enter Crossrails or Novice. Beginners may only enter Crossrails. A rider may only ride one horse in an Equitation over fences, but may ride more than one horse in Hunter over Fences.

Judged Jumping Warm-up: To be judged the same as Equitation over Fences.

Equitation over Fences: To be judged on Equitation over a course of at least 6 jumps.

Hunter over Fences: To be judged on an even hunting pace, jumping style, way of going, and manners over 8 jumps.

Small Equine In Hand Hunter over Fences: Hunters are to be judged on style, manners and way of going, with preference given to those equines that cover the course at an even pace, with free flowing strides, as in a brisk trot or canter, but must maintain same gait throughout the entire course.

Walk-Trot Crossrails: May not enter any other jumping class. To be judged as equitation. Height of fences no more than 18 inches. Open to Beginners.

Jumping Warm-up: 6:30AM Saturday, sign up available at show, no fee, 4-6 riders at a time for up to 15 min/group. You must supply a mandatory adult supervisor for your practice group.

Lead Line Class: For children 5 years and older as of the day of the show. To be shown at a walk and may be asked to trot/jog a little bit. Judged on ability to maintain seat and position and exercise some degree of control. Those leading must be 14 years or older. All children will receive participation ribbons.

Pairs Class: You will enter the ring side by side and remain side by side throughout the class. To be shown at the walk, trot/jog and canter/lope both ways of the ring (depending upon division). To be judged 80% on the pair's ability to stay together throughout the class while performing the required gaits (with leads to count) and 20% on matching and looking alike. (Each participant must pay an entry fee.)

Pleasure Classes: To be shown at the walk, trot/jog and canter/lope both ways of the ring (depending upon division). Horses must stand quietly and back readily. All horses may be asked to extend any gait.

Project Classes: To be shown at the walk, trot/jog and canter/lope (depending on division). Driving Project to be shown at a walk, trot and extended trot. To be judged 60% on riding/driving ability, suitability of equine to exhibitor and control of equine, 40% on general knowledge, to be determined by questions from the judge.

Quiz Bowl: There will be one round of questions for each age division: 8-10 year olds, 11-13 year olds, Seniors 14-18 years. All participants must be prompt in their arrival on Friday evening, 7/8 to compete in Quiz Bowl, at their age group's designated time, with their exhibitor number. There may be tie breakers, listen for announcement.

Ranch Riding: Ranch Riding Pattern #3 will be used. The ranch riding horse should reflect the versatility, attitude and movement of a working horse. The horse's performance should simulate a horse riding outside the confines of an arena and that of a working ranch horse. This class should show the horse's ability to work at a forward working speed while under control by the rider. Light contact should be rewarded and horse shall not be shown on a full drape of reins. The overall manners, responsiveness of the horse while performing the maneuver requirements and the horse's quality of movement are the primary considerations. Open to Advanced Beginners, Juniors and Seniors in Western tack.

- Each horse will work individually, performing both required and optional maneuvers and scored on the basis of 0 to 100, with 70 denoting an average performance.
- The required maneuvers will include the walk, jog and lope in both directions, the extended jog and extended lope in at least one direction, stops and backs.
- Three optional maneuvers may include a side pass; turns of 360-degrees or more; a change of lead (simple or flying); walk, jog, or lope over a pole or poles; or some combination of maneuvers that would be reasonable for a ranch horse to perform.

Ranch Rail Pleasure: The ranch rail pleasure class measures the ability of the horse to be a pleasure to ride while being used as a means of conveyance from one ranch task to another and should reflect the versatility, attitude, and movement of a working horse. The horse should be well-broke, relaxed, quiet, soft and cadenced at all gaits. This class should show the horse's ability to work at a forward, working speed while under control by the rider. Light contact should be rewarded and horse shall not be shown on a full drape of reins. Part of the evaluation of this class is on smoothness of upward and downward transitions. The overall manners and responsiveness of the horse while performing the maneuver requirements and the horse's quality of movement are the primary considerations. To be shown at the walk, jog and lope both ways of the ring. Horses must stand quietly and back readily. All horses may be asked to extend any gait. Open to Juniors and Seniors in Western tack.

Beginner/Advanced Beginner Road Hack Classes: To be judged on performance as a road hack animal (shown either English or Western). Both divisions will be shown at the walk, trot/jog and extended trot/jog. May be asked to back. Advanced Beginners will be shown additionally at the canter/lope, but not at the hand gallop.

English Road Hack: To be shown at a walk, trot, road trot, canter and hand gallop. Excessive speed at the hand gallop will be penalized. Horses are asked to stand quietly and back readily. To be shown under English tack, and martingales and dropped nosebands are not permitted. To be judged on performance, manners, suitability for a road hack, substance and conformation. Ponies are allowed.

Western Road Hack: To be shown at a walk, jog, extended jog, lope and extended lope. (See rules above for English Road Hack). No posting or 2-point position.

Small Equine Classes: Open to equines 12 hands and under or Miniature horses under 39 inches; must be at least 2 years or older. They may cross enter into the driving division classes.

In-Hand Trail: To be judged over 5-8 obstacles on an outside course. Full details found in the New England 4-H Horse Show Rules and Guidelines under Halter Obstacle.

In-Hand Suitability: This class judges the communication between handler and equine. Handlers will enter the ring at a walk while going the first way of the ring. Entries will be asked to follow given commands on the rail both ways of the ring that may include walking, trotting, stopping, backing and turning at any gait. Handlers and equine will also be asked to execute a pattern. Patterns may include any of the above gaits as well as ground tying. Equines and handlers will be judged 70% on suitability as a team in communication and execution of rail work, 15% on pattern completion and 15% on presentation of both handler and equine.

Western Reining: Exhibitors will be asked to perform a reining pattern, with or without music. There is no time limit. Pattern #3 will be used and posted and printed in the pattern booklet.

Trail Classes: To be judged over obstacles on an outside course. Exhibitors will report for trail class after the completion of their Fitting and Showmanship classes. There will be two trail rings operating at the same time. <u>An order of go will be posted, starting with Western Trail and Beginner Trail followed by Ranch Trail and Advanced Beginner Trail as stated in the class order.</u>

Versatility Class: To be shown in English tack first, and may work over 2 jumps, not to exceed 18". All entries will then change to Western tack in the ring and after working on the rail, entrants may be asked to ground tie their horses. All rail work will be judged as pleasure classes. Grooms are required for the tack change. Horses will be asked to back in both sets of tack.

PLEASE BE ENVIRONMENTALLY FRIENDLY

Each year we throw out recyclable material at this horse show. In an effort to be more earth friendly we would like to ask each club to bring one or more trash cans with cover(s) to recycle your bottles and cans in and then take home with you or use the recycle bins on the grounds. You may want to donate the returnable bottles and cans to a charity of your choice or use as a bottle drive for your club. Plastic water bottles can also be recycled in most places. This can be a way for you as 4-H members to help the environment. Please feel free to decorate these containers and place them in your stall or camping areas. Thank you, your show committee.

THE UNIVERSITY OF VERMONT STATE 4-H HORSE SHOW DRESSAGE DIVISION

The dressage division of the State 4-H Horse Show is intended to be a learning experience. We will generally follow guidelines set forth by the USEF (United States Equestrian Federation) and USDF (US Dressage Federation) but will make a few exceptions in order to accommodate riders who may be new to the dressage experience.

We will try to offer an informational meeting to answer questions and help you be successful. If you have any questions about this show, your equipment, or need a reader, or about dressage in general, please attend. Check the Show Office for meeting time.

DRESSAGE BASICS

- Dressage shows are organized differently from open shows. You enter to ride a test, which is a series of defined movements within the dressage arena. The test lays out what pattern to ride, at what gait, and explains what the judge will be looking for. Each movement defined in the test will be given a score between 0 and 10 by the judge. Six scores for the general quality of the ride are also given. The scores are added up and given as a percentage for that test.
- Tests are entered based on the horse's training, not the rider's age or ability. Horses may only be entered in consecutive level tests (for example, Training and 1st levels; NOT Training and 2nd levels).
- ~ You are assigned a ride time for each test you enter, and you must present yourself at the in-gate at that time or forfeit.
- It is possible to get "lost" or make a mistake in the ring. If that happens, the judge will blow his/her whistle. If you don't know where to go next, or you hear the whistle after you begin your test, stop and look at the judge. She will tell you what to do. The rider is not allowed to talk in the ring except to answer a question from the judge (that includes no clucking or "kissing" to your horse!) Readers may read the test but may not converse with the rider or anyone else. Only the judge is allowed to talk.

RULES AND GUIDELINES FOR THIS COMPETITION

- 1. To get copies of the test before the show, you may download them by searching USEF 2019 Training, USDF 2019 Intro, or 2022 WDAA tests.
- 2. Ride times will be grouped by level. Present yourself (or a representative) to the Steward at the designated start time for the level to set an order of go. Designated start times will be posted at the Show Office.
- 3. Appropriate rider attire and tack/equipment for equitation at this show will be accepted in the dressage ring. If you are unsure if something is legal, come to the informational meeting.
- 4. You may have someone read the test for you while you are riding. If you need a reader, come to the informational meeting and let the dressage manager know.
- 5. You will have a brief chance to warm up around the outside of the arena as soon as the rider ahead of you has finished their ride and makes their final salute. When the judge is ready for you to begin your ride, the judge will blow the whistle (or ring a bell). Once the whistle blows, you should go directly to the gate and begin your test.
- 6. Because Beginners may not canter in a show, they may only ride in USDF Introductory tests A and B. Advanced Beginner riders may choose to do any of the tests because they will be cantering in the arena alone. Juniors and Seniors are permitted to enter any of the tests being offered at this show.
- 7. Because this show only offers tests one level apart, riders may enter any tests. If you enter either Test of Choice classes, you must indicate the test on your entry blank.
- 8. Post Entries will be allowed only to fill scratches or drops. A maximum of 60 rides will be scheduled. The Judge has the final say on any question or score.

Most important of all, try it, and have fun!

Paul was an equine photographer, whose family raised and showed Morgan horses and whose three daughters were all involved in the 4-H horse program. This perpetual trophy was started in 1979.

Showmanship Champion Perpetual Trophy

The Upwey Equestrians 4-H Club proudly sponsor the Showmanship Champion Perpetual Trophy. It is given in honor of all its members who have excelled in the showmanship arena, and all they have chosen to pursue in the horse world over its 35 years of formation. This was started in 2017.

Overall High Point 4-H Champion in Memory of Designated Hit – Started in 2011

This is award is presented to the 4-Her with the highest overall score in the 4-H division. This award is presented by the Ackerman family in memory of their gelding Designated Hit. "Hitter" was a horse that taught his rider everything from patience to responsibility, but most importantly to never give up on your dreams. Hitter was the first horse to receive the Paul Quinn Memorial three years in a row and the Versatility Award two years. The 4-H State Horse Show was always one of the favorite shows the Ackerman family attended and wish to dedicate this trophy to their best friend.

Other Special Awards are:

Jim Wallace Memorial Pleasure Class is a perpetual award offered for a special class. Jim Wallace was a 4-H parent who worked diligently at the show for several years. His two daughters were in 4-H and participated at the show, so Jim just pitched in and did whatever he could, from setting up to running errands during the show, to helping with the clean up. He was always there to help. This special pleasure class and the trophy are presented to honor his memory. This perpetual trophy was started in 1984.

Melissa Issler Alumni Equitation Class is a class for former Vermont 4-H Horse Show riders. These riders may be just out of 4-H, or they may be leaders now or parents who have previously competed at the Vermont 4-H Horse Show. The perpetual award is given in memory of 4-H member Melissa Issler, who lived and breathed 4-H. Melissa attended Eastern States and the Eastern National 4-H Horse Roundup and was involved in many different aspects of 4-H. This award was given in Melissa's memory by her mother Cathy Boomhower. This perpetual trophy was started in 1999.

The winner of the **Versatility Class** is presented a perpetual plaque donated by Mary Fay to honor her horse, who was shown at the Vermont 4-H Horse Show for 20 years. Marci Mac was shown by several 4-H members over the years who had the privilege of using her as a project horse. She was shown in all age divisions, as well as hunt seat, saddleseat and western. Marci made her final appearance at the Vermont 4-H Horse Show in 1996, at 30 years of age and being ridden by the same rider as in her first appearance in 1976! This perpetual trophy was started in 2000.

Club Award: presented to the club with the most points gathered by its top placing members in General Knowledge, Judging, Quiz Bowl, Fitting and Showmanship, and 4-H Project classes.

All trophies and plaques are perpetual and must be returned to the show the year after that in which it was awarded. These trophies/plaques are: the Beginner, Advanced Beginner, Junior, Sr. 4-H awards, Overall Highpoint 4-H, Showmanship; the Dressage High Scorer trophy; the Jim Wallace Memorial Pleasure, the Marci Mac Versatility and the Melissa Issler Alumni Equitation awards; and the Club Class plaque.

If you need more space then you may need to pay for another spot. Lights go out at 10:00 P.M
