Impacts

The Community News Service is a student-powered partnership between UVM and community newspapers across Vermont. The program pairs student reporters with a professional editor to provide critical reporting to local news outlets. The goals of the program are to educate students for futures as ethical journalists and engaged citizens and to provide professional reporting to community newspapers to help support a sustainable future for Vermont news media.

Faculty/staff

A faculty member is responsible for teaching the course, which is an introductory journalism class, while the editor, a staff member, edits student stories and manages relationships with partner organizations

Funding sources

But the biggest gifts have been individual alumni with help from our foundation office — totaling more than \$200,000 over three years.
