

## ENROLLMENT AND SIZE

- 11,081 undergraduates
- 1,709 graduate students (including 34 post-baccalaureate certificate students), 491 medical students, 545 non-degree students
- 16:1 undergraduate student/faculty ratio
- 99% of classes are taught by faculty (only 1% by graduate assistants)
- 77% of classes have fewer than 40 students; 45% of classes have fewer than 20 students; average class size: 34

## FACULTY AND RESEARCH

- 1,708 full- and part-time faculty; 88% of full-time faculty hold terminal degrees.
- \$204 million in sponsored funding

## DIVERSITY

- 12% of undergraduates are students of color; 37% of medical students and 15% of graduate students
- Undergraduates by race/ethnicity: Black/African American: 114; Asian: 305; Hispanic 504; Native American: 3; Native Hawaiian: 1; multiracial: 345
- 27% of undergraduates are Vermont residents; 43% of graduate students; 25% of medical students
- All 14 Vermont counties are represented in the undergraduate population; 45% of Vermont students are from Chittenden County
- Students hail from 49 states and 41 countries/areas.
- 192 international students (1.7%)
- 75 student veterans (all levels)

## EXPERIENCE-BASED LEARNING

- 92% of seniors report being engaged in research, an internship or other experience-based learning/high impact practice while at UVM
- 40% of seniors report involvement in research with a faculty mentor during their time at UVM
- 500 study abroad options in more than 70 countries; 24% of undergraduates studied abroad in 2019/20 (pre-COVID)
- 87 service- and civic-learning courses (SL/CL); 44% of seniors have taken at least one service-learning class while at UVM; 147 community organizations are partnering with SL/CL courses
- 10,000+ internships are listed by the Career Center
- \$285,000+ awarded in internship stipends
- \$300,000+ available in research funding for undergraduates

## PROGRAM OFFERINGS

- 100+ bachelor's degree programs
- 57 master's degree programs
- 27 doctoral programs
- 36 accelerated master's programs

## SCHOLARSHIPS AND FINANCIAL AID

- 89% of undergraduates receive scholarships or financial aid; 36% overall undergraduate tuition discount rate not including tuition remission; 45% of Vermonters attend tuition free (includes tuition remission)
- \$41 million in UVM grants and scholarships awarded to first-time, first-year undergraduates and transfer students, including fall and spring admits, not including athletic grants or tuition remission
- \$146 million total UVM support (loans, grants, scholarships and tuition remission) awarded to all undergraduates
- Average loan indebtedness: \$28,808 for in-state students; \$36,274 for out-of-state students
- 36% of in-state students and 46% of out-of-state students graduated without loans
- 28% of in-state undergraduates are Pell Grant recipients; 11% of out-of-state students are Pell Grant recipients

## STUDENT OUTCOMES

- First-year student retention: 88%
- Four-year graduation rate: 69%
- 93% of graduates were employed or continuing their education within six months of graduation (3-year average, Classes of 2018-20)
- 95% of those employed full-time are satisfied with their positions (3-year average, Classes of 2018-20)
- 68% of graduates were employed within six months of graduation (3-year average, Classes of 2018-20)
- 24% of graduates were continuing their education within six months of graduation 3-year average, (Classes of 2018-20)
- Admit rate to medical school: 54% (national rate: 41%), Admit rate to law school: 78% (national rate: 70%); Admit rate to veterinary school: More than 90% for animal science majors (national rate, approx. 50%)
- 78 students have won or been finalists in scholarship competitions ranging from the Fulbright to the Goldwater in the last five years

### CAMPUS LIFE

- 100% of first-year students live in themed residential communities
- 250+ clubs and organizations include 40+ service clubs promoting health, literacy, and/or social justice
- 82% of first-year students are involved in a club or co-curricular activity (2019/20 stats/most current)
- 18 Division I athletic teams; nearly 60 club sports
- 500+ participants in our annual student research conference in 2019; 200 participants in our 2021 virtual conference and 2,600 views. Most recent figures reflect campus-wide shift to online programs due to the COVID-19 pandemic

## UVM AND VERMONT

### UVM INVESTS IN VERMONT STUDENTS

- 45% of UVM students from Vermont attend tuition-free, due to direct financial support
- 91% of Vermont students receive scholarships or financial aid
- \$17,314 in Scholarships and Financial Aid for every Vermonter attending UVM (average, per student)
- 89% of Vermont first-year students return for their sophomore year
- 75% of Vermont students graduate from UVM in 4 years—higher than Vermonters achieve at all other in-state public colleges and out-of-state private schools, according to VSAC survey
- 30% of first-year Vermont students are Pell-eligible; 25% of in-state UVM graduates are first-generation college students
- \$0 Tuition increase since 2019 (In-state and out-of-state tuition)

### VERMONT INVESTS IN UVM

- Half of UVM’s state funding directly supports land-grant agriculture, medicine, and extension education
- The other half of state funding directly supports Vermont student scholarships and financial aid

### UVM STRENGTHENS VERMONT’S WORKFORCE

- UVM is **#1** in attracting and retaining talent to Vermont
- 1,034 Vermont students earned UVM degrees in 2021
- 467 recent graduates from Vermont live and work in Vermont (2019 Career Outcomes Report)
- 594 recent graduates from out-of-state live and work in Vermont (2019 Career Outcomes Report)
- 4,125 faculty and staff employed by UVM, the second largest employer in the state
- \$231 Million in extramural support for advanced research
- 35,994 UVM alumni live and work in Vermont creating “brain gain” for the state
- \$313 Million UVM’s total payroll in 2020
- \$1.33 Billion UVM direct and indirect economic impact in Vermont (According to a 2016 study)
- The Office of Engagement, UVM’s new “front door”, has already connected with 365 CEOs and entrepreneurs in all 14 counties of the state
