The plant sale originally scheduled for 5/30 has been postponed due to the uncertainty of the current health predicament. We hope to hold it in the Fall but no date has yet been set.

In the meantime, Irene and Martha are happy to report that the plants that were fostered last year at Martha's house (inside and out) are growing well. There are a ton of irises (well really not THAT many, but a lot), 12 clumps of chives, some columbine, salvia and succulents. Spider plants are at every available window and growing profusely. We have a generous source for peonies which are best transplanted in the fall. Please save pots for the event!

- 1) While we definitely hope that the sale will happen in the fall, if anyone is SOOO overwhelmed by their plants and needs to "rehome" them this spring, Martha has space to foster them until the sale actually happens. Obviously that would need to wait until the current stay-at-home orders lift before something is brought over ... unless you happen to be heading to Poulins' Feed Store (formerly Whitman's) for animal feed or whatever because she's just up the street.

Congratulations to two Interns from the class of 2019! Martha Beauchamp and Irene Goyette met the 40





## Yellow Barn Community Garden

The Yellow Barn is located on the banks of the Battenkill River on RT 313 West and owned by the Town of Arlington. In 2019, fellow Interns and EMGs revitalized the entrance garden. In 2020, Irene Goyette and Dottie Sundquist, Co-Project Leaders, are working with a group of community members to revitalize a community garden on the site. The small group of individuals represents a balanced skill set: UVM Extension Master Composter, local Arlingtonian/gardener, two experienced community garden workers and UVM EMG's Irene and Dottie.

Our mission is to create a place where community members learn to grow their own fresh food, compost the scraps and gather for informative gardening demonstrations. We are in the planning stages of building raised beds with compost bins nearby to show individuals exactly what the process entails. We plan to offer hands-on demonstrations that will offer science-based research to further their knowledge.





We look forward to the day when we are able to announce group work sessions! In the meantime, if you happen by, you will find a parking area just to the rear of the barn and any time you spend tidying the garden by the entrance counts toward certification! When you are done feel free to cross the bridge and walk upstream along the river path through the Arlington Recreation Park.
