*What is your favorite area of gardening to learn about?

I love garden design seeing the creative and imaginative use of plants in so varied ways. I have had the absolute good fortune to have visited gardens here and abroad ranging from the very formal and symmetrical to the wild and crazy. All having their own charm that draws you in.

*What is your favorite pest to manage?

One of my approaches is to use disease resistant plants such as Phlox"David" and the tomato Magic Mountain. I also like to use mulching under tomato plants and copper based fungicides for fungal diseases.

*What would you consider to be your pride and joy in your home garden?

I really don't have a "pride and joy" but do have some "must haves". As one of my favorites, Rudbeckia "Prairie Sun" is spectacular! The blossoms are huge with green eyes with petals transitioning from gold to lemon yellow. They're rated zone 5 with most coming back in the spring. They start well indoors about 8 week before the last frost date. They could be bought at Von Trapp's but they are closing.

Lisianthus, echo series, is another "must have". They have a somewhat succulent appearing 10" foliage with rose like

blossoms. It is an annual and challenging to start from seed

indoors with a very long germination time. So I buy them at Pine Tree Gardens in Bristol.
