Course Description This course is essentially devoted to the study of the writings of Dante Alighieri, in particular the *Vita nova* and the *Commedia*, which we will both read in their entirety in light of recent scholarship and taking into account different commentaries and critical approaches. We will also read parts of Dante's unfinished treatise on language (*De vulgari eloquentia*) as well as excerpts from his book on political theory (*Monarchia*), and his philosophical compendium (*Convivio*), works that are essential for a fuller understanding of the poet's masterpiece. In addition, we will read relevant passages from the *Bible* and from works by Virgil, Ovid, and the Troubadours. Basics of prosody and rhetoric will also be introduced and reference will be made to a variety of literary theories of interpretation that are of relevance to Biblical, Classical, Medieval, and Renaissance Studies. However, the main emphasis will be laid on extensive yet close textual reading. You will be responsible for reading all assigned texts before coming to class and be ready to comment on them or lead the discussion. Issues concerning translation will also be addressed throughout the semester.

Response papers Roughly every other week you will be required to write a short paper, normally a couple of pages long, dealing with the reading material and addressing, directly or indirectly, at least one of the study questions that I will supply.

Quizzes There may be **unannounced quizzes** on the *Commedia* aimed at verifying your familiarity with the material that you are expected to have read.

Individual and group research Throughout the semester you will be asked to undertake different kinds of research, both individually and in small groups. Research tasks will be communicated in class.

Presentations During the last weeks of the semester you will teach part of the class yourselves, each one of you presenting and explaining one particular canto to your fellow students. The cantos to be presented will be assigned to you randomly and you will not have the possibility to substitute them.

Assignments All written assignments must be typed and double-spaced and will <u>not</u> be accepted late.

Attendance Class attendance is mandatory and absences should be avoided, as they <u>will</u> negatively affect the final grade. A maximum of **3** absences (excused and/or unexcused) is permitted during the semester.

Prerequisites The course is a sophomore seminar designed for Honors College students and does not have other prerequisites. No knowledge of any foreign language is expected.

Grading Policy Your grade will be determined in the following way:

25% Class work 15% Individual and group research 15% Response papers (5 out of 6)

15% Midterm 15% Individual presentation 15% Final paper / Exam
