

WHAT WILL YOU LEARN?

Students majoring in Forestry learn the science, practices, and techniques to conserve and sustainably manage forest ecosystems for the diverse needs of society from local to global scales. Courses in a diversity of classroom and field settings provide students with a base knowledge in the biological, physical, and social sciences that is applied to developing strategies for the stewardship of forest ecosystems in the context of a diversity of objectives and environmental conditions.

WHAT WILL YOU DO AFTER YOU GRADUATE?

The Forestry major provides students with the training, skills, and perspective to succeed in a wide range of forest and natural resources positions. These include: forester, urban forester, arborist, park ranger, conservationist, forest manager, environmental educator. environmental planner, forest ecologist, forest health specialist, habitat manager, park naturalist, researcher/ scientist, restoration specialist, silviculture specialist, and wilderness manager.


