## Methodology - Vermonter Poll III

The data used in this report was collected by the Center for Rural Studies at the University of Vermont as part of the annual Vermonter Poll. The survey was conducted between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. beginning on March 17, 2008 and ending on March 28, 2008. The telephone polling was conducted from the University of Vermont using computer-aided telephone interviewing (CATI). The sample for the poll was drawn using a simple random sample of telephone exchanges in the state of Vermont as the sampling frame. Only Vermont residents over the age of eighteen were interviewed. The poll included questions on a variety of issues related to public policy in the state of Vermont. There were 600 respondents to the 2008 Vermonter Poll (Version III). The results based on a group of this size have a margin of error of plus or minus 4 percent at a confidence interval of 95 percent.
