Historic Preservation Program Course Descriptions - Fall 2016

HISTORY OF AMERICAN ARCHITECTURE (90299) HP 200A Study of architectural history to gain fluency in the stylistic terms so essential to historic preservation and to public support for conserving our architectural heritage. **Prerequisite:** HP 1 graduate students; upper level undergraduates by instructor's permission; CE students register for HP 200 ZRA. MCCULLOUGH, Robert 3 Hours MW 3:30-4:45 HP 204A **HISTORIC PRESERVATION DEVELOPMENT ECONOMICS (95173)** This course offers the student an in-depth survey of the financial and procedural aspects of real estate development as it pertains to the preservation and reuse of historic buildings. Participants learn how to prepare market studies and pro formas as part of a collaborative case study on an actual endangered or underutilized historic property. The course includes lectures, guest speakers from the development industry and field trips. The course is open to contractors, leaders, developers, artisans, designers, and planners. Prerequisite: HP 1 graduate students; upper level undergraduates by instructor's permission; CE students register for HP 204 ZRA PHILLIPS, Josh/WYNCOOP, Paul F 12:00-3:00 3 Hours HP 205A **HISTORIC PRESERVATION LAW (91200)** Legal issues in conservation of the built environment. Basis legal techniques for protection of historic structures (historic districts, protective legislation, easements, covenants). Study of significant court decisions. Prerequisite: HP 1 graduate students; upper level undergraduates by instructor's permission; CE students register for HP205 ZRA 3 Hours MCCULLOUGH, Robert TR 4:25-5:40 HP 206A **RESEARCHING HISTORIC STRUCTURES/SITES (90308)** An introduction to historic preservation research methods and documentation techniques used by professional historic preservationists to identify and to record historic structures and heritage sites using archival and physical evidence. The course introduces various techniques for heritage site research and documentation, including the development of building descriptions, historical narratives, digital photography, GIS, CAD measured drawings, and publishing on the web. Prerequisites: HP 1 graduate students; upper level undergraduates by instructor's permission VISSER, Thomas 3 Hours W 12:00-3:00 HP 302A **COMMUNITY PRESERVATION PROJECT (90310)** Third-semester graduate students apply developed professional skills to actual community preservation problems. Projects include strategy development, securing and allocating funds, research, advocacy, and implementation. **Prerequisites:** HP 2 graduate students only 3 Hours MCCULLOUGH, Robert R 1:15-4:15

HP 303A GRADUATE HP INTERNSHIP (90313)

Participants will gain experience working in the preservation field as an employee of an appropriate institution or agency, typically over the summer months. During the fall semester, students prepare professional reports and make formal presentations about their completed internship work.
