Morrill, Sawyer, Smyser, Goodnight and Martin of Indiana. The House then at 5:05 adjourned.

MAN'S WEAKER NATURE BROUGHT TO THE FRONT.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 30.—Matthew H. Osborn, colored, aged 30, a carpenter, while at work this noon was overcome by the heat and died in a few minutes. Fell Over an Embankment.

STAMFORD, Conn., July 30.—Hugh Gadlan, while walking on the track late Saturday night near Coscob, fell over an embankment and was so injured that he has since died. He lay all night as he fell, his spine hurt and skull fractured, and he contracted pneumonia. He was 46 years of age. His family resides at Coscob for the summer.

Throw Himself Overboard.

PORTLAND, Me., July 30.—Rosie St. Denis of Eugene, P. Q., a maid in the family of F. R. Alley of Montreal, while in bathing off Cousin's Island yesterday, got into a dory and hauled anchor. The boat began drifting out to sea when the girl threw herself overboard and was drowned before assistance could reach her.

A Quarrel and What Came of it

NEW HAVEN, CONN., July 30.—Samuel A. Flight of Hampden quarrelled with one of his farm hands to-day and struck him several blows and discharged him. The laborer told Flight he would make him sorry he struck. An hour later Flight's new barn was in flames. It burned to the ground with \$600 worth of hay, \$100 of wheat, several sleighs, wagons etc. The barn cost \$2,700. Total loss, \$4000.
