

## TWO COUNTY CONVENTIONS

Washington County Republicans Nominate George W. Randall and Frank A. Dwinell for Senators.  
[Special to the Free Press.]

MONTPELIER, July 31.—The Washington county republican convention assembled at 10:30 a. m. to-day in Capitol hall and opened with prayer by Rev. A. B. Truax of Montpelier. Delegates present, 139. G. W. Tilden of Barre, chairman, William A. Lord of Montpelier, secretary. The chair appointed F. Plumley of Northfield, J. H. Hastings of Waitsfield, George Webster of Cabot, C. M. Bennett of Montpelier and Dr. O. Worthen of Barre, a committee on resolutions, and Hiram A. Huse of Montpelier, E. J. Bartlett of Plainfield, Dr. C. J. Hunt of Worcester, C. C. Warren of Waterbury and Richard A. Hoar of Barre, a committee to present nominations for the county committee.

For first senator, Frank Knight of Waterbury, presented the name of George W. Randall of Waterbury, which nomination was seconded by William Chapin of Middlesex, Dr. D. G. Kemp of Montpelier and L. P. Martin of Marshfield. Mr. Randall was unanimously nominated by acclamation.

For second senator, H. O. Perry of Plainfield presented Frank A. Dwinell of Plainfield, seconded by O. D. Clark of Montpelier and C. R. Dwinell of Calais. Richard A. Hoar of Barre presented O. B. Boyce of Barre, seconded by E. E. Andrews of Barre and F. Plumley.

The result of the ballot taken was 139 votes, 70 necessary for a choice, of which Mr. Dwinell received 70, Mr. Boyce 66, 3 scattering. The nomination of Mr. Dwinell was made unanimous.

After recess, G. W. Tilden of Barre, J. W. Brock of Montpelier, D. W. Huntley of Waterbury, F. Plumley of Northfield, J. M. Fisher of Cabot, J. Haylett of Moretown and H. D. Vail of Worcester were elected county committee for the two years ending.

For first assistant judge, J. E. Eldredge Warren presented H. W. Lyford of Warren, and he was unanimously nominated by acclamation.

For second assistant judge, Hiram Wells Cabot presented T. H. Lance of Cabot and C. R. Dwinell of Calais presented Cabot. The ballot showed 89 for Mr. Lance and he was declared nominated.

For judge of probate, Hiram Carleton of Montpelier, the present incumbent, was unanimously nominated by acclamation.

For State's attorney, F. Plumley presented Hon. Zed S. Stanton of Roxbury, seconded by W. A. Lord by request of J. Wing, also by W. C. Nye, Barre, H. A. Huse, Montpelier, J. H. Hastings, Waitsfield, and W. E. Barney, Barre, and the nomination was made by acclamation.

For high sheriff, J. C. Houghton of Montpelier presented John L. Tuttle of the same place, and W. W. Holden of Northfield, presented E. W. Howe of that town. The first ballot was a tie, 69 for each candidate, and the second ballot gave Howe 78, Tuttle 69.

For high bailiff, J. L. Mosely of Northfield, and for county commissioner, Albert Hohnott of Montpelier were nominated.

## Fire at East Wallingford.
