Sept. 20. 1838 -

Testimony in Br. Clough's case -
O. Chipman. Br. Clough acknowledged
charges in conflict that he had no conscience
in the case since his first visit. I had long
neglected family prayer & this conversation
was first had few days before Christmas
at my house - I in July day before
Chh meeting - I saw Br. McKendie
Did he manifest penitence or not?
answer - entire indifference
Q. Did you ask him if he prayed in
his closet? answer - not in that form -
I asked him if he had enjoyment in
religion? He said, he lived so he
could not expect to have -

Joseph Parker - When I first went to see
Br. Clough I talked with him on many
religious subjects. I remarked to him
I had not seen him to meeting
for long time - he said no -
visited him several times before
I went to labor with him - At that
time I took him up into his chamber
I prayed with him & conversed with him
some time & then presented the charges
in the complaint distinctly before
him He admitted them, He stated
his difficulties, no doubt they have influ-
enced him in some degree to neglect duties
